Preservation

Veranda Repair for Preservation and Public Safety

In 2022, the Veranda Balcony was assessed by Millrock Restoration and determined in need of immediate repair and restoration. The wood structure runs the entire length of the second floor of the adobe and is a key architectural feature of the 1844 adobe home. Thanks to generous gifts from Steve and Nancy Dudley and the Long Beach Navy Memorial Heritage Association, the Rancho will begin repairs in 2023, ensuring its stability and the safety of all guests.





Fire Detection and Suppression System

Rancho Los Cerritos has taken the necessary steps to protect and preserve the historic site for generations to come by implementing fire protection across the site. Our ultimate goal is to fully mitigate the risk of fire damage to our historic structures and irreplaceable collections. Currently, no fire detection or suppression measures are in place to protect RLC facilities and artifacts. In 2022, we hired Heritage Protection Group, a world-renowned consulting firm, to assess the site and design a system for maximum protection. With funding through a capital grant from the City of Long Beach, as well as another generous donation from the Dudley Family, the Rancho will be able to install a fire detection notification and suppression system in 2023.

Volunteerism at RLC

Volunteers play a crucial role at Rancho Los Cerritos. Their dedication assists in preservation, enhances visitor experiences, and fosters a sense of community engagement, ensuring the continued vitality and relevance of this historic site.

During 2022, 169 volunteers, 20 of them brand new, contributed 10,358 hours. Regularly facilitating public hours, specialty events, gardening, curatorial work, outreach, education, serving on the foundation's Board of Directors and so much more, RLC volunteers are truly the lifeblood of the Rancho. Their level of support is equivalent to more than five additional full-time staff members, and we are so grateful!







Innovation & Environment

Looking Back to Advance Forward

In 2022, we kicked off construction of our innovative stormwater retention and reuse project, *Looking Back to Advance Forward*. The yearlong process began by assessing the site through geotechnical surveys to determine the level of infiltration throughout. Various percolation tests were executed, and we determined that on-site infiltration levels are optimal for such a project.



A 22,000-gallon underground cistern was installed, pervious concrete and permeable pavers were put in throughout the site, and a series of drains were included to direct any water that does not naturally filtrate back into the cistern for use in our drip irrigation system. Additionally, we constructed an





RLC is now capturing 95% of stormwater to use for onsite irrigation, preventing runoff that drives litter, chemicals, and pollution into storm drains leading to the ocean. The completion of this project will lead to the creation of a STEAM (science, technology, engineering, arts, mathematics). educational curriculum, programs, and tours to address critical issues of today - climate change, environmental justice, and water conservation.

Historic Gardens and Grounds

Recognized by the City of Long Beach as an essential resource for the community's health and well-being, the Rancho provides accessible green spaces over much of its 4.7 acres. The beautiful native garden, orchard, and historic trees are part of environmental conservation efforts that also protect the natural habitat for wildlife.

Visitors enjoy historic trees planted in the mid-19th century as well as lush landscaping designed in the early 1930's by notable landscape architect Ralph D. Cornell. Interacting with nature correlates with reduced depression, anxiety, and stress and offers measurable mental and physical health benefits.







Exhibition

Roots in California: Concepts of Home

"Roots in California: Concepts of Home" is the Rancho's first Mexican and Mexican American exhibition that helped expand our interpretation of history at RLC, document and highlight the lives and labor of Mexican and Mexican Americans, and address gaps in our collection through research and collaboration. This community-driven exhibition demonstrated the importance of the Rancho in the development of the city of Long Beach and allowed RLC the unique opportunity to spark conversations about social issues and affirm its commitment to amplifying the stories that have been overlooked.

Funded by the National Endowment for the Humanities and the Port of Long Beach, this was the first exhibition developed following Rancho's DEIA values. In the past, the narrative had primarily focused on the site's landowners, whereas this exhibition focused on the complex idea of home by contrasting the oral histories of Mexican and Mexican American tenants who lived at Rancho Los Cerritos between 1890-1930, with five stories of Mexicans and Mexican Americans living across California today. In a first-time partnership with Long Beach Transit, visitors were provided free bus transportation from the Michelle Obama Library in North Long Beach. These efforts resulted in the best attended exhibit opening in RLC history, with over 400 visitors.




Education

Guests are welcome to tour the historic grounds virtually or in person through engaging docent-led or self-guided tours.




Birding Opportunities


Stewardship
